

Intent of Crosswalk Planning

Crosswalk planning will allow the Contra Costa Community College District the opportunity to establishment a analysis trends based on verified datasets, vision, and distinct college culture of the three colleges and sites in the district service area.

Crosswalk planning will facilitate interoperability between allocations in the district and serve as a basis for the EMP refresh and collaborative decision making needed for the FMP.

In short, it will acknowledge individual voices and place an emphasis on collaborative planning, based on meeting students where they are.




FIGURE GROUND

Pittsburg Campus

- Identifies the mass of the buildings
- College Complex is a larger footprint compared to the other buildings on campus.
- The majority of the buildings east of the college complex are at a similar size/footprint.



CAMPUS ORGANIZATION

Pittsburg Campus

- The built campus is contained within the core of the campus boundaries.
- There is a clear east/west axis that several buildings follow and a north south axis that align the buildings.
- A campus core green space is at a center and along these axes.




LEGEND

--- Campus Axis




VEHICULAR FRAMEWORK






• Continue the internal development of campus.



Axes


• With a focus on strengthening the existing axes and the campus core.






Vehicular Circulation

• The road network would largely remain unchanged, with a loop road that wraps around the campus.



Opportunity Zones

 Opportunity zones will tightly align with the campus structure and infill pockets of space.



Open Space

 The open spaces will radiate from the core of campus and create pockets of space within the tighter network of buildings,



Pedestrian Circulation

 Pedestrian paths will follow the open space network connecting to points throughout the campus,




Program

- The majority of the campus core is academic
- Student life and administration are concentrated to 3 locations and connected through the campus core.
- Athletics spaces are concentrated to the north-east.
- Housing is located at the north-east edge of campus completing the axes.




External Orientation

• Develop the Campus towards the north edge of campus.









Axes

 The east west axes is duplicated on campus.









Vehicular Circulation

 Vehicular circulation shifts and becomes more integrated into campus.




Opportunity Zones

- The opportunity zones are concentrated to the north edge of campus and along the campus roads.
- The north south campus road aligns with the main (central) entrance.
- The east- west roads are brought closer to the core of campus.




Open Space

• The open space moves to the north creating a large central green network.



Pedestrian Circulation

- The pedestrian network weaves north south and east west throughout the campus grid.
- New pedestrian paths towards the north strengthen the new housing and student life spaces.



Program

- Academic space permeates throughout the campus.
- Athletics move south.
- Housing is at the north side of campus along E Leland Road.
- Administration is located at one of the main entrances to campus.
- Student life nodes support students through the campus and uses.




OPPORTUNITY ZONES & VEHICULAR CIRCULATION
