CCCCD Teaching Academy Call for Proposals for 2017-2018

The Faculty Senate Coordinating Council (FSCC), in collaboration with the district-wide professional development committee, is offering faculty an opportunity to share their expertise, learn from one another, and earn .5 upper division units for salary advancement by completing a 20-hour course. We are now accepting proposals for courses to be offered in Fall 2017 and Spring 2018. Funded by district professional development monies, the first step is to ask faculty, who might be interested in developing and teaching a course, to submit a brief 1-2 page proposal to include:

- which topics the course would cover
- description of how the course would address teaching and learning in our instruction
- brief description of weekly activities
- technical support, if needed
- who might be interested in taking the course

The courses could be taught face-to-face at one of our colleges, or partially or fully online. Enrollment would be open to any employee in the district who is interested in the topic, and course access and content should be stored within Canvas, CCCCD's course management system. There would be no charge for taking the course, as it is offered as a professional development "institute" under our present contract. The minimum number of hours the course should meet is 20 hours, with compensation of a \$2000 stipend for the instructor. It is possible that some of those hours could be held during intercessions and/or during flex, with a max of five hours per week. The remaining hours could be held during the course of the semester.
