This family of courses focuses on utilitarian and craft applications in art. Functional design is foregrounded, and issues in production, scaling, and cottage industry are discussed. Currently, wheel thrown pottery and jewelry are the subjects offered in this family, but it could eventually be expanded to include textile or fiber arts, paper making, furniture design, and other applied arts. Jewelry is frequently separated from metal casting and other sculpture courses in college and university curricula, recognizing that while some of the casting techniques are the same, there are philosophical, aesthetic, and other considerations unique to jewelry and functional object design. Pottery is typically distinguished from other ceramic sculpture by archaeologists, art historians, and artists as ceramic ware that has a primary functional value. The ceramic courses in this family are distinct in that they use the specialized technique of wheel throwing, which produces radially symmetrical shapes from the potter's wheel, very different from the techniques used in ceramic art. Regularity and consistency are emphasized over expression. Students in this track of courses would go on to work in production pottery, cottage industry, or get degrees in Applied Design, which typically have emphases in materials of wood, metal, clay, and fiber.
