Budget & Resource Allocation Resource Allocation Process (RAP) Vice President Porter reported that he has completed the RAP "road show," presenting the proposed recommendations to all of the constituency groups, and has brought the item back to SGC for their action. He reminded the group that this is a conceptual framework, and the procedural details will have to be ironed out (with some SGC members likely tapped to serve on the working group to do that). VP Porter stated that the Academic Senate is supportive of the recommendations, but had several questions related to transparency: if resource requests will be viewable by the campus; how categorical allocations will be managed; and how the rubric will be developed, and whether it will be made available to "authors" prior to submitting requests. President Kratochvil noted that it is important to have transparency with the campus community and public when it comes to the budget, but that we need to be mindful about publicizing any personal info (e.g. individual salaries and benefits). With the new RAP recommendations approved, President Kratochvil and VP Porter provided a brief recap of the information presented at the District Budget Forum yesterday. Based on the proposed revision to the State's funding model for community colleges, at this point it is not known how much money LMC may have available for RAP. The proposed model is projected to result in a \$9M reduction to the District's annual budget – with LMC's portion of the reduction at approximately \$2.5M/year. The State's proposed model would include a "hold harmless" clause for the first year. President Kratochvil has asked VP Porter to outline several "what-if" scenarios to assist with addressing these potential budget reductions (e.g. if the College has to deal with a \$2.5M annual reduction beginning in 2019-20, if LMC encounters an economic downturn in 5 years, etc). She explained that, since AB 705 is now codified, all community colleges must be in compliance no later than Fall 2019.		
Professor Hiltbrand outlined the data included in the handout, reflecting the improvement in student success rates. She not	ed	
that, as an institution, LMC will have to look at what kind of support/wrap-around services – and what the campus commu		
thinks of as support services – now that more students will find themselves placed in a "high-stakes situation" (e.g. 1.9GPA)
