Miranda went to the Enrollment Strategy and Planning committee and talked about the new semi-Ride, which is a bus transportation they offer to students where it will take students from Pittsburg to Brentwood campus – it will also have drop-off in certain areas with drop off areas from Antioch, Oakley, Pittsburg, and even Brentwood. committee.
Miranda also talked about DGC in which priority
registration was being written for student government
officers, and not all student government like senators
and so she reached out to Kelly Schellen after that
meeting, who is the District Executive Vice Chancellor
for Education and Technology, asking for clarification
on logistics and reasoning why it was only being
offered for student officer positions, and she emailed
her back a few days ago. Miranda shared that she
received an email response clarifying that priority
reserves an eman response damying that priority

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registration was only intended for student government officers. The district was not aware there was an expectation for it to extend to all student government affiliates. According to the email, this decision was made through STAC discussions over two years, where incentives were evaluated and ultimately limited to officers due to their higher workload and responsibilities. Technical challenges in coding all active members for priority registration were also cited. Additionally, many student government members may already qualify for priority registration under other criteria listed in Student Services Procedure 3024. Meeting is on November 4, in Martinez, for the next STAC meeting. Members noted that the policy makes sense since officers represent the entire student government or program, whereas senators and members have fewer responsibilities. Appreciation was expressed for Rion's comment highlighting this distinction. It was also mentioned that Kelly, the district's Vice Chancellor, provided a thorough and

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for priority registration.
It was noted that DVC has approximately 15–20 officers, LMC has around 5 executive board members
(officers), and CCC also has about 5.
Members were reminded to be critical of how terms like "officer" are defined across campuses, since definitions vary.
Several members already have priority registration through programs such as EOPS, DSPS, Puente, Umoja, Mesa, or Honors.
A senator raised the question: if many student government members already receive priority registration, what additional effort or benefit would come from formally encoding it into the system?
The advisor explained the process: each year, program offices submit a spreadsheet (CSV file) listing eligible students, which is uploaded by the district office to assign registration priority.
Adding student government members would mean including an additional spreadsheet in this system. The group discussed the distinction between elected positions (commissioners, president, VP) and

Despite progress, inequities in college-going rates and postsecondary access persist locally. 2025–2028 Student Equity Plan (SEP): The SEP continues LMC's commitment to advancing equitable access, persistence, completion, and

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transfer, grounded in its status as a Hispanic-Serving
