

INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS PROGRAM

A COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO CELEBRATE AN EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT

On Tuesday, June 19th, 2012, 300 dignitaries, community partners, and guests came out to celebrate the Contra Costa County Children and Family Services high school graduates of 2012 at the Independent Living Skills Program's 24th Annual Recognition Dinner. The Independent Living Skills Program serves youth in the foster care system between the ages of 16 and 21 in the areas of education, employment, housing and resources. Overcoming many obstacles, 92 youth from the foster care system were honored for their accomplishments.

The program began with a Poem titled "I was, I am, I will be" written by Cal State East Bay bound high school graduate, Jessica Schaffer. It set the tone for a night filled with inspiration and generosity.

The venue was generously donated by The Calvary Temple Church of Concord and volunteers from the church helped with the set up, lighting, sound and video.

The dinner itself was sponsored by The Wellness City Challenge, Tom's Classic Catering, The National Association of Social Workers, Foster a Dream and The Orinda Woman's Club. Guests were treated to a full course meal prepared by Cindy Gershen of Sunrise Bistro and her 7 amazing assistants. Dinner was served by volunteers from Calvary Temple and The Golden Hills Churches.

The night was highlighted by presentations by the Honorable Judge Lois Haight, acting Child Welfare Director, Lois Rutten, alumni speaker, Jeannette Quintero, and University of Stanford bound high school graduate Joelle Williams.

Our concrete personal values and principles keep us grounded and secure, as they lay the foundation on which we build ourselves, on which we live our lives." Her message that we control the way that our houses will be constructed was a powerful statement to cap the evening.

Our Mistress of Ceremony, former ILSP participant, Daniella Poy-Wing, a graduate of Samuel Merritt and St. Mary's College and is now a Public Health Nurse for the Public Health Department summarized the spirit of the evening by saying, "It's great that we can now give back to a program that has given so much to us."

You want to show them that you are the best candidate for the position. This means the more work you're willing to put into your resume the better it will pay off.

3. Be Confident

Many teens and young adults show a tendency to be hard on themselves and minimize their accomplishments. Learn to talk about yourself in a positive, confident manner without boasting. Stay focused on what you can do for the company

with the skills or knowledge you have. Remember that a job interview is not the place to beat yourself up. Instead, emphasize flattering details about yourself, such as volunteering in the community.

4. Don't Give Up

Don't give up. Consider volunteering as a good way to network and gain experience/skills that are valuable in increasing your job opportunities. You can find volunteer opportunities at

your local community center, library, hospital, youth center, church, etc.



Standard ILSP

The Standard Independent Living Skills program provides services to youth still in care between the ages of 16 through 19. The primary focus of the standard ILS program is to identify all eligible youth and provide emancipation services with the goal of preparing them for responsible adulthood.

After Care

About ILSP

The Post Emancipation Program was developed to provide after care services for our emancipated youth. Youth are eligible to participate until their 21st birthday. The post emancipation program is staffed with Specialists to assist with educational, employment, and housing needs.

An array of workshops, classes, and activities are offered to meet the needs of the youth.

"We Deal in Futures"

Question: What is ILSP about and what can it do for my youth?

The Independent Living Skills Program is a federally sponsored program that empowers in-care and emancipated foster vouth with the skills and resources needed for successful emancipation from the foster care system. ILSP offers workshops, one on one assistance and resources. Some of the information/resources that they can expect to receive in workshops and while working with ILSP include (but are not limited to):

- locating, budgeting applying for and maintaining rental housing
- housing programs for dependent, emancipated and nonminor dependents.

- how to locate, apply and maintain gainful employment, summer jobs, internships
- interviewing tips and techniques
- employment and educational
- tips on selecting a college or vocational program
- how to apply to college, vocational programs, apprenticeships
- how to pay for college and vocational programs using financial aid, grants and FAFSA applications and ILSP
- the difference between loans. grants and scholarships
- locating and applying for scholarships

- saving/budgeting for school and independent living
- writing checks, securing credit, personal accounting, opening a checking account
- using credit effectively
- to make sound choices regarding partners, friends and acquaintances
- cooking basics
- navigating your neighborhood and local government agencies and services
- financial incentives for completing their high school diploma, GED, and enrolling in college or vocational training.
- a clothing closet where youth shop for free
- an emergency food pantry
