Now that You Have Been Accepted to Contra Costa College (CCC), Diablo Valley College (DVC) or Los Medanos College (LMC)

We hope that the following information will help you during your arrival at the Contra Costa Community College District (CCCCD) and in your move to the San Francisco Bay Area.

Things to Consider

You should bring a copy of transcripts from high schools, colleges or universities previously attended. If you are planning to transfer your units from other institutions to CCCCD, or challenge a course prerequisite, you

will need to show proof of your transcript in English. Course descriptions or outlines are also required.

Proof of Medical Insurance

Students accepted to DVC must enroll in the CCCCD International Student Health Insurance plan (information provided on acceptance to the college). It is possible to waive the insurance only if you have purchased insurance that is comparable to what DVC offers. Students accepted to CCC or LMC may also enroll in this insurance plan or submit a copy of their current health insurance plan.

Although CCCCD health insurance coverage will begin on the first day of school, it is highly advisable that you maintain your personal coverage at least until the semester begins. Students quite commonly also maintain their own private medical insurance policy for maximum protection or to include vision or dental coverage.



Financial Resources for Housing, Tuition, Fees and Other Living Expenses

It is not a good idea to carry a large amount of cash. Plan your budget very carefully and bring enough cash to cover your initial expenses. You may want to keep in mind the following start-up expenses:

- Tuition and fees for the semester you plan to attend (you will be required to pay this amount at the time you enroll in your classes)
- Books and supplies (estimate between \$200 \$500 for each semester)
- Medical insurance fees
- Transportation
- Housing deposit and rent (damage deposit and first and last month's rent are generally required up front)
- Utilities, if applicable (telephone, electricity, gas, etc.)
- Food
- Recreation
- Appropriate clothing for the weather

Arrival Plan (before you leave home)

- Arrange transportation from the airport to your hotel or apartment (see **Transportation**)
- Bring proof of hotel reservation or copy of apartment rental agreement (see **Housing Options**)
- Transportation to and from school (see **Transportation**)



- Credit cards, if any
- Electrical adapters, if necessary. American household current is 110 volts, AC 60 cycles. Foreign appliances without adapters will not work here.

English Language Ability: Students with a TOEFL score of 450 or higher will follow the normal assessment, orientation and placement procedure. Applicants with TOEFL scores lower than 450 or with no TOEFL must take English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. Students taking ESL classes may be permitted to take academic classes leading to transfer to a 4-year university if they obtain approval from an ESL advisor.

Diablo Valley College offers an associate degree, certificate, transfer and vocational programs. The college consistently rates as a top feeder school to the University of California and California State University system. For the past several years, Diablo Valley College has sent more students to UC Berkeley than any other California community college.

English Language Ability: Students must have a TOEFL score of 500 (or 173 on the computerized TOEFL) to be eligible for admission. If you do not have the required TOEFL score, you may attend the International Education Center at Diablo Valley College (IEC@DVC; www.iec-dvc.org) before attending DVC. IEC@DVC offers a six-level program which is designed to prepare students for successful study at DVC or other colleges/universities. Each program level is eight weeks long. Classes meet 25 hours each week and the maximum class size is 15 students. Students who finish the highest level English class with a grade of B- or better, can be admitted to DVC without the TOEFL requirements.

International Student Admissions and Services

Los Medanos College is a full-service community college which offers a comprehensive fast-track transfer program for students who wish to pursue baccalaureate degrees, associate degrees and certificates of achievement. Upon completion of the transfer program, many international students have the opportunity to transfer to four-year institutions in University of California and California State University systems. Furthermore, a unique advantage of the college is that Los Medanos is small enough for instructors to give students personal attention, yet large enough to attract faculty and administrators from highly acclaimed universities.

English Language Ability: While it is recommended that international students have a TOEFL score of 480 or higher, it is possible to gain admission with a lower TOEFL score if the student agrees to take required credit ESL courses upon meeting with the faculty ESL advisor. This requirement will remain in effect until students meet the English language proficiency requirements or finish the top level of ESL classes. Students with a TOEFL score over 500 will follow the normal assessment, orientation, and placement procedure and will be counseled into appropriate classes.

Previous Coursework/Credential Evaluation Agencies

If you plan to use any previous coursework towards your Associate in Arts Degree, or to verify that you have met a particular course requirement, you will need to bring your transcript verifying the classes you have taken and the grades you received. To use any foreign coursework towards our Associates in Arts Degree, international students will be required to have their foreign credentials evaluated by an approved credential evaluation agency. If you plan to transfer units to any other school, you must contact that institution directly to ensure that the units will transfer.

Tutoring

Our tutoring services are decentralized and offered at various locations, such as within departments, in ongoing labs and through the Learning Centers. Tutoring can help students succeed in specific courses when they are having difficulty.

ESL Tutoring: Drop-in and regular tutoring are available to help students build the skills needed for success. Other services include college success workshops, short-term classes, and computer-assisted instruction in study skills, reading and writing.

Math Lab: Drop-in tutoring for all math courses is available. An instructor and student tutors are there to help with math problems. Lab time is required for some math courses.

Computer Center: The centers are equipped with IBM compatible and Mac computers. Students from many departments use the center to do lab work for their computer science classes.

Media Center: The Media Center's collection contains films, video tapes, foreign language tapes, slide programs and videodiscs. All materials may be viewed by students in the Media Lab for use in their own research or to make up for a missed viewing in the classroom. Equipment is available for general listening and viewing or other course projects.

Working on Campus

Students are allowed to work on campus as student assistants. The only requirement is that the student is in F-1 status. F-1 students can only work at the campus they are attending and they must have a form filled out by the Designated School Official (DSO) indicating they are in-status before they can begin employment. Students must also have a Social Security number, with the correct spelling of your name (please refer to the following section on **Social Security Cards**).

Student jobs are limited in availability, and there is no way to apply in advance. The jobs are very popular among our international students, as this is the only type of work for which they are eligible. Of the jobs available each semester, the hours that are assigned to each student cannot exceed a maximum of twenty hours per week. The current hourly pay is \$7.67. Some job classifications will pay a higher hourly salary. As jobs become available, they are posted at the respective Job Placement Center on each campus.

Off-Campus Employment

In cases of **economic hardship**, international students may work off campus, if the following conditions are met:

- Must have been in F-1 status for nine academic months
- Must be able to demonstrate unforeseen severe financial problems
- Approval is granted by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS)

Curricular practical training (CPT) is an alternate work/study internship, cooperative education or any other type of required internship or practicum which is offered by sponsoring employers through cooperative agreements with the school. To be eligible, international students must meet the following requirements:

- Must have been in F-1 status for nine academic months
- Must be required for program completion or offered as an optional course, i.e., Cooperative Education
- Training is limited to a maximum of 12 months, unless an extended period is required for the program of study
- Training may be full-time or part-time. **If full-time** (more than 20 hours per week) **for 12 months or more, the student becomes ineligible for optional practical training**. There is no limit on part-time curricular practical training.
- Approval is granted by International Student Admissions and Services on campus

Optional practical training (OPT) is temporary employment for practical training directly related to the student's major area of study. To be eligible for OPT, international students must have been in F-1 status for nine months. OPT is available only to students in college level programs. OPT is available for a maximum of 12 months after completion of each level of education, i.e., A.A., B.A., M.A., Ph.D.

General Information about CCCCD

Following are the types of optional practical training:

- Vacation Period Practical Training. A student may work up to 40 hours per week during the summer vacation or during the break between semesters;
- While school is in session (pre-completion practical training). A student may work up to 20 hours per week while attending a program of study;
- Post-Completion Practical Training. A student may work up to 40 hours per week after the completion of a program.
- Approval is granted by USCIS.

Students who believe they are eligible for practical training or work based on economic hardship must see the DSO at the International Student Office for approval of employment request and for information on how to complete the appropriate paperwork. You cannot work on or off campus without approval.

Social Security Cards

F-1 Students Only

F-1 students are not eligible to receive a Social Security Card, unless they have been hired as a Student Assistant at one of our three campuses. The following are documents that you must present at the Social Security Office:

- Form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Card
- At least two documents that show your age and identity including a passport and one additional document establishing identify
- Form I-94
- SEVIS Form I-20
- For on-campus employment, you will need a letter from the DSO stating that you are enrolled in a full course of study and are authorized to work
- An original letter from the Job Placement Center stating that you have been hired as a Student Assistant

You may also be required to bring other forms of identification. Please check with the DSO before going to the Social Security office. Apartment Rentals

There are a variety of apartments available for rent in and around our three campuses. Free lists may be found in local newspapers, in rental magazines available at local supermarkets or on the Internet (i.e., www.rent.net, www.rent.net, www.rent.net, www.rent.net, www.rent.net, <a href="https://www.homestore.com). When you choose where you want to live, think about safety, transportation, and, if you do not have a car, be sure that the things you need (i.e., shopping, library, etc.) are near enough to reach easily by walking, taking a bus or riding a bicycle.

Useful Tips to Keep in Mind when Selecting your Accommodations:

What to expect: When renting an apartment, be prepared to fill out a background check, which usually requires bank account information, previous addresses and personal and professional references. Please note that California law now prohibits presenting evidence of a Social Security number when renting an apartment. It is normal for a landlord to require first and last month's rent, and a damage deposit. Utilities (water, gas, electricity) may or may not be included in the rental amount. This information will be contained in your lease; this is a legally binding agreement, so make sure to read it carefully before signing.

About leases: Landlords are looking for responsible, financially secure tenants. They usually prefer to have local references. If you have difficulty with this process, please see the DSO at your campus.

When you find the apartment of your choice, make sure you receive a lease agreement. All rental agreements or leases should be in writing. Read it thoroughly and make sure you understand it completely. If there is any language you do not understand, ask a reliable person to explain it to you. If your landlord does not give you a copy, it is important to request one; your lease and/or rental agreement are the only evidence of your legal tenancy and are designed to protect both parties' rights.

At a minimum, a lease or rental agreement should include the following:

- Rental rate
- Required damage deposit
- Length of occupancy
- Apartment rules
- Termination requirements

Some questions you may want to ask include:

- What is the amount of rent?
- What is included in the rent (i.e., gas, electric, water, parking, laundry, etc.)?
- How many people may occupy the apartment?
- When and how must rent be paid each month?
- If roommates share the apartment, who is responsible if one should leave?
- Under what conditions is the damage deposit refundable?
- What is the length of occupancy?
- What is the landlord's right of entry?
- What is the sublet policy?
- What is the guest policy?
- What are the rules concerning pets, conduct and use of recreational facilities?
- Whom do you call for emergency repairs?
- Is parking available; if not, where do you park?
- How, where and when do you dispose of trash?
- Is the apartment located near public transportation?

If repairs are needed before you move in, make the rental agreement contingent upon these corrections and agree upon a completion date. This agreement should be in writing, dated and signed by both parties.

It is always good to pay rent by check, not cash. Write the purpose on the face of the check (example: "June rent for Apt. #1, 123 Jones St."). If you must pay in cash, get a signed and dated receipt from the landlord.

Leasing versus month-to-month renting: Most apartments are rented under either a lease agreement or a month-to-month rental agreement. A lease agreement is usually for a one-year term. Remember that you will be responsible for the rent for the entire lease period, even if you wish to move out. Before you sign a lease agreement, make sure that you are completely satisfied with the accommodations, and that you like the landlord.

Some landlords allow month-to-month rental agreements: This type of arrangement allows you and the landlord to have more flexibility. The negative side of this arrangement is that the landlord may decide not to renew your rental agreement, and you will be forced to relocate at the end of one month. The rates for month-to-month renting may be higher than for leasing.

Damages: Protect yourself from false accusations of damage by going through the apartment with the landlord before you move in. Make a list of existing damages, paying attention to appliances, cracked plaster, damaged draperies and carpets, lighting fixtures, etc. Ask the landlord to sign this list and date it. Sign it yourself, and make copies for both of you to keep. Should you damage the premises, you are responsible for making repairs. You are expected to leave the apartment in the same condition as when you moved in.

Subletting: If, for any reason, you need to leave before your lease expires, some landlords will allow you to sublet to another tenant. You would most often do this if you want to travel during school breaks, but do not wish to lose the right to live in that apartment after returning. Subletting is only allowed with the landlord's permission, and some landlords do not permit it. Keep in mind that even if you have permission to sublet, you are responsible for the rent payment each month, whether or not you have collected it from the sub-tenant. Be very careful when you choose your sub-tenant and have him or her sign an agreement which states the amount of rent, the dates of occupancy, and a statement that all damages caused during your absence will be fixed. If damages are not fixed, you will not be able to collect your security deposit when you move out. It is wise to get information about the sub-tenant's family, workplace and anything else that might be helpful in case you return to find that he or she has disappeared and left you with unexpected expenses.

Things You Should Know After You Move



Utilities: You may be responsible for paying the cost of your utilities (water, electricity, gas and telephone). Ask your landlord how to get these services turned on. The utility companies may require you to pay a deposit before service is activated. These deposits will be refunded to you or credited to your account when you terminate your service, provided you have paid all of your bills.

Household current is 110 volts, AC 60 cycles. Foreign appliances without converters/adapters will not work here. Also, when the service representative comes to connect your gas, ask him or her to show you where the pilot lights for heater, stove and water heater are located and how to turn them off in case of an emergency.

Appliances: Ask your landlord or building manager to show you how to use and clean your stove, oven, refrigerator, heater, air conditioner, dishwasher, garbage disposal and other appliances which are included in your rent. Remember that gas stoves, if turned on but not lit, are dangerous because gas is poisonous and explosive. If you detect the smell of gas in your apartment and cannot determine why, call PG&E (1-800-743-5000). They will send someone to check it for you. There is no fee for this service. Burners on electric stoves may be hot without appearing red in color. Electric burners will stay hot for some time after the control has been turned off.





Refrigerator: You may have to defrost the freezer compartment of your refrigerator to keep it working properly. Some refrigerators defrost automatically. Others must be turned off for several hours until the ice melts naturally. Do not allow frozen foods to thaw while defrosting your refrigerator unless you plan to use them right away. It is a good idea to store food in a neighbor's freezer. If your frozen food thaws, do not refreeze it. Use it immediately or throw it away.

Right of Entry: The landlord has the right to enter the premises at reasonable times to inspect and make repairs but usually the landlord will not enter your apartment without calling to ask permission or notify you that there is work to be done.

Repairs: If the landlord fails to make reasonable repairs, the tenant, after repeatedly asking for those repairs in writing, has the option of making the repairs himself (only if the cost does not exceed one month's rent) and applying the amount of the repair as a deduction to the next month's rent. If the repairs are more expensive than that, the tenant has the right to leave the apartment without the 30 days notice.

Homestay Program

Students have the option of choosing to be placed in a homestay program. A homestay program is a <u>guaranteed</u> placement with a family that wants to be a host family to an international student and can provide you with good exposure to the American way of life. The student will be provided with a room and meals for \$650.00 a month. There is a one time \$200.00 placement fee paid directly to **Fia Parker** (pictured right), the **Housing Coordinator** for the colleges. Homestay Program: Expectations of a Student

Living with a host family gives you insight into the lifestyles and cultures of families in the United States. It is important to share in your host family's activities - they will appreciate your interest. Sharing these fun times will also greatly enrich your experience. Your host family will play a very large part in your life in the United States and will be there to assist you when you need help. Students living in homestays are asked to meet the following expectations:


- Participate in your host family's life, and share your life with them.
 Host families have invited you into their homes and lives to share
 their time with you. If you are never home or always in your room
 with the door shut you miss their companionship and the opportunity
 to practice English and learn about American family life.
- Have a good attitude, and be helpful to your host family. Remember that you will be living as a member of the family in their home – not as a guest that is going to be waited on by the other family members.



- Communicate directly with your host family. Talk about any problems and speak up about yourself. If you don't understand something *ask again*; don't worry about making mistakes using English. Be sure to communicate your feelings and concerns. If a problem comes up, be sure to talk about it, otherwise your host family may not be aware that something is wrong.
- Respect your host family and their home. Follow the House Rules set by the family. If you do not understand a rule, ask the family to explain it to you.
- Pay your rent on time every month. It is your responsibility to pay your family the family should not have to ask you for money.

Homestay Program: Expectations of Host Family

- The host family must be willing to treat the student as a
 member of the family and spend quality time with the student.
 This is the most important factor, and families should have
 lifestyles that allow them to fulfill this requirement.
- Provide a private bedroom for sleeping and studying.





Housing Bulletin Board on Campus

There is a housing bulletin board at each campus. Various types of housing are posted. This is open to all students. The student must get the information from the board and make the calls on their own. The Associated Student Body Office at each campus updates this board and should be contacted if the student has questions.



Telephone Services



Once you have found a place to live, you may want telephone service. The main telephone company for the Bay Area is SBC. SBC can be reached by accessing their website at www.sbc.com. You can view the various packages they offer for college students. In addition, you may want to check out their "Universal Lifeline Flat Rate" package. This package allows people who have two or less persons in their household earning \$19,300.00 or less per year to pay only \$5.30 per month for unlimited local calling. There is a \$10.00 one time connection fee. (Most students qualify for Universal Lifeline as long as they show proof of no income.) SBC also has various international plans. You may also want to search the web for other economical providers of international services. Some independent companies offer 20 minute calls to international destinations for only \$1.99. Purchasing calling cards from local drugstores and supermarkets also enable you to make cheaper international calls.

When you sign up for service, the telephone company will send you a phone directory for your area at no cost to you. The White Pages in the phone book contain listings of household customers. The Pink Pages contain listings of local businesses. The Yellow Pages have paid advertisements for local businesses.

Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV)

If you will be driving in California and are going to purchase a motor vehicle, you must get a California driver's license. International students may drive rental cars in California for one year as long as they have a valid driver's license from their home country. (Please note that under California law, DMV can no longer request applicants to present a Social Security number.) In order to get a driver's license or California identification (ID) card (which is used for identification purposes only), you will need to do the following:



- Make an appointment with the DMV
- Complete application form DL-44
- Present a valid foreign passport with a valid record of arrival (I-94)
- Give a thumb print
- Have picture taken
- Take and pass a vision exam

Department of Motor Vehicles

- Take and pass a traffic laws and signs test (only for a driver's license)
 You will want to study the *California Driving Handbook* before taking the test. This booklet comes in several foreign languages. Students are allowed to take the written test in their native language if that test is available. In addition, if students are taking the test in their native language, they will also need to the take the driving signs test. This booklet is free of charge at DMV offices and can also be downloaded from www.dmv.ca.gov.
- Take and pass a driving test with a car that you provide (only for a driver's license)
- Proof of financial responsibility (car insurance; only for a driver's license)
- Pay the fee (\$20.00 for an ID; \$24.00 for a driver's license)

Free Roadside Assistance

If you have a flat tire and/or run out of gas while on the road, there is a free service paid for by the Bay Area Transportation Commission, CalTrans and California Highway Patrol (CHP) that is able to assist you. This service is primarily available during commute hours, generally from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. or 10:00 a.m. and from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. or 7:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Weekend service hours are limited.



Money and Banking

Currency

American currency is comprised of dollars and cents. Dollar currency is mostly in bill notes (although some dollar coins exist), whereas cents are coins. Dollar bills are the same size in all denominations and have the same general appearance. When currency or coins are used, it is called "paying in cash." The word "cash" is used to mean payment by dollars rather than credit cards or checks.

Bank Accounts

There are two basic kinds of accounts:



- Checking accounts for payment of regular bills and needs
- Savings accounts for money you do not need to use immediately and can earn interest

Before you open a bank account, be sure to visit several banks to compare their services and fees. Opening an account is fairly easy—deposit your funds and complete any required

bank forms. (If you are making a deposit with an overseas check or bank draft, you may have to wait one or two weeks before your money will be available to you.)

After opening an account you will be given a book of temporary checks, but you should order checks with your name and local address on them. Most businesses will only accept a check that has the printed information.

Never sign a check before you are ready to use it, since it can be cashed as soon as your signature is on it. Most merchants will require that you show one or two pieces of photo ID to accept your check. These can be a California Driver's License or Identity Card, a passport, or other official ID. Merchants near campus might accept a student photo ID card.

Deposits: Deposits to your accounts can be made with a bank teller or at an ATM. It is best to use a deposit slip when making a deposit (pre-printed from your bank or a filled out slip). Always use a deposit slip if depositing cash. To deposit a check made out to you, you must first "endorse" or sign the check on the bank. You should also print "For Deposit Only" and your account number after your signature. After you endorse a check it is as good as cash and can be used by anyone unless you have added the deposit notation and account number.

ATM (Automatic Teller Machine) Cards/Debits Cards: An ATM card is used for two purposes: as a banking tool to access your bank accounts and as a debit card. Most cards can be used at any ATM anywhere, and can be used for purchases. Many businesses now accept debit cards for payment. A debit card works very much like a check because it takes money directly out of your bank account to make a payment. Note that some banks have fees for the debit use of a card and if an ATM at another bank is used.

When you open an account, you will be issued an ATM card (the card will come in the mail). The card is directly linked to your bank accounts. At the bank, you must think of a Personal Identification Number (PIN) to be linked to your ATM card. Use a PIN that is easy to remember. Never write your PIN down, and never give or tell your PIN to anyone-ever- not even to a bank employee. When using an ATM, be sure that no one sees your PIN. If your ATM card is ever lost or stolen, notify your bank immediately.

The deadline for filing income tax forms is the same day every year, that is, April 15. Internal Revenue Service (IRS) *Publication 519*, *U.S. Tax Guide for Aliens* explains what you will need to do to file your U.S. income tax return. A convenient website to visit is www.taxes.ca.gov. Questions can be answered within two days by using their online service, "Ask tax question by e-mail." **DVC offers workshops on income tax preparation in March**.

Since garage sale items are often sold at the lowest possible price, it's a good idea to bring along cash for your purchases. Some families will refuse checks at garage sales.
