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Celebrating FACCC PAC-Endorsed Election Wins

The Faculty Association of California Community Colleges (FACCC) PAC celebrates

FACCC PAC-Endorsed Candidates Make History in California Legislature

The recent election marks a historic milestone as FACCC PAC-endorsed candidates [Jessica Caloza and Christopher Cabaldon become the first Filipino American duo to serve concurrently in the California State Legislature](#). Caloza, now representing Assembly District 52, is the first Filipina American elected to the California State Assembly. With a strong win of 67.1 percent over her opponent, she aims to prioritize economic equity, education reform, and immigrant rights for her Los Angeles-area constituency. Caloza brings a wealth of experience in public policy, including roles with the Los Angeles Board of Public Works and the U.S. Department of Education.

Christopher Cabaldon, who won Senate District 3 with 61.2 percent of the vote, is now the first Filipino American in the California State Senate. With a background as the long-time Mayor of West Sacramento and as a professor at Sacramento State University, Cabaldon's platform focuses on sustainable development, economic growth, and support for small businesses.

Together, Caloza and Cabaldon's election marks a new chapter for Filipino American representation, bringing diverse perspectives to California's policy-making.

California's Response to Federal Policy Concerns

With Donald Trump returning to office, many in California's education community are bracing for potential impacts on students and their families. Trump's past and promised policies on immigration, diversity, and educational equity have renewed anxieties, particularly among immigrant, LGBTQ+, and marginalized communities. California educators and advocates are actively working to ensure that campuses remain inclusive and supportive environments amid this uncertainty.

[California law provides robust protections for students](#), regardless of federal changes. [Key measures like AB 699](#), passed in 2017, protect immigrant students by restricting information collection and limiting immigration enforcement in schools. Additionally, the landmark Plyler v. Doe Supreme Court ruling guarantees that all children have

the right to public education, irrespective of immigration status. These protections reinforce California's commitment to inclusivity across TK-12 schools, community colleges, and universities.

[In this time of heightened anxiety](#), educators play a vital role in upholding California's values of safety, support, and access to education for all students. By fostering an open, welcoming environment, our state's faculty and staff help ensure that campuses remain spaces where students can thrive, free from fear, with assurance of their rights and protections.

#RealCollege Curriculum Equips Faculty and Staff to Support Student Success

As higher education costs continue to climb and college demographics diversify, [basic needs insecurity has emerged as a critical factor in student retention](#). National data reveals that 22.6 percent of undergraduate students and 12.2 percent of graduate students face food insecurity, while 8 percent of undergraduates and 4.6 percent of graduate students experience homelessness.

To address these challenges, the [#RealCollege curriculum](#) was launched on October 28 by [Believe in Students](#), a nonprofit dedicated to supporting students' basic needs. This four-part online course is designed to equip higher education faculty and staff with a deeper understanding of students' basic needs challenges. The curriculum's first course, *The Students We Have*, introduces participants to the realities of student insecurity, offering resources to develop skills that support student success.

The #RealCollege curriculum aims to improve access to student support services by educating faculty and staff on practical strategies and "pedagogies of care." Each course runs 60 to 90 minutes, featuring video presentations from experts, self-reflection activities, and student voices. Faculty feedback from pilot sessions indicates 72 percent of participants felt more prepared to help students access resources, with 80 percent intending to make actionable changes on their campuses.





