		C. Treasurer's Report: No report provided.
5.	Presentation	<u>Vision for Success Goal Setting-Greg Stoup</u> : Greg Stoup from District Research & Planning presented on
		establishing our goals to align with the CCCCO (State Chancellor's Office) system-wide goals as part of the Vision
		for Success (strategic plan) in conjunction with the new funding formula. Greg reviewed our history through
		present day, utilizing a data lens to see where we were five years ago, where we are now and where we need to be
		in five years according to the goals we need to set. There are five state-wide goals with numeric targets attached to
		four of the goals. Each goal has a five-year time horizon with the baseline year being 2016-17 and the target year is 2021-22.
		• Goal #1: Increase by 20% the number of LMC students annually who acquire degrees or certificates (we select
		either as our indicator). In 2016/17 (baseline year) LMC awarded 1069 degrees and 623 certificates; last year
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		(2017/18) LMC awarded 1209 degrees and 802 certificates; in 2021/22 we need to have 1283 degrees or 748 certificates awarded. Please note – the certificates counted are only CCCCO approved certificates and not sk certificates (i.e. 16 units or more).  • Goal #2: Increase by 35% the number of students transferring annually to a UC or CSU (using either comple ADTs or transfers as our indicator). In 2016/17 we had 492 transfers and awarded 306 Associate Degree for

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Transfers (ADTs); in 2017/18 we had 562 transfers and awarded 372 ADTs; in 2021/22 we need to have either 590 transfers or 367 ADTs to reach the goal.

- <u>Goal #3:</u> Decrease the average number of accumulated units by associate degree earning students from 87-79 (this does not include ADTs). In 2016/17 the average number of accumulated units for a degree-earning students was 81.8; in 2017/18 it was 81.8; in 2021/22 we need to reach 79 accumulated units.
- Goal #4: Increase the percentage of existing CTE students who report being employed in their field of student from the state average of 69% to a rate of 76%. This is a difficult goal to track as there is not consistent and accurate data to support it. The data we have is self-reporting and the response to the query is not overwhelming. According to the CTEOS data that is available, in 2015/16 LMC was at 68.7%. The data is not available yet for the 2016/17 year so as of now we must use 2015/16 as our baseline year. We need to be at 76% or above in 2021/22. Is there verbiage related to this goal pertaining to students obtaining a degree or certificate in a CTE program?
- <u>Goal #5:</u> Decrease the equity gaps across all above measures by cutting achievement gaps by 40% within five years among the traditionally underrepresented groups outlined in your student equity plans. This goal currently does not have any data released to support it.

May 31<sup>st</sup> is the deadline for the College to submit their indicators and goals. Greg will come back to the Classified Senate at our March 11<sup>th</sup> meeting for a second read and approval.

Strategic Plan 2014-2019: An Educational Master Plan for LMC (SPEMP). The Office of Planning & Institutional Effectiveness is currently gathering your input and "stories" from the past four years related to the four strategic planning goals. During this meeting provide your "stories" of achievement and/or improvement on one or more of the strategic planning goals utilizing the Classified Senate lens (i.e. Crab Feed, All-Senate Meeting, Chili Cook-Off, etc.). Therefore, DGC did not approve the changes to the policy.</li> <li>B. SGC: Recent SGC meetings have included resource allocation or RAP on their agenda. This year there is approximately \$200,000 that can be allocated towards RAP funding. All RAP requests must be entered into the Budget Request Database (BRD) otherwise referred to as the "parking lot". If a request is not funded, it will remain in the parking lot for two years at which time a request will be sent to the originator to review and resubmit and/or update the request. All of those managers responsible for categorical funding in their area will have access and are able to review the database. If they locate a request that aligns with their funding priorities and/or goals, they can opt to fund it.</li> <li>C. Enrollment Management: No report</li> <li>D. The Academic Senate is currently discussing and will be voting on whether LMC should join an OEI (Online Education Institution).
