Due to the entrepreneurial nature of the current graphics job market it's exceeding difficult to find relevant industry partners. Rather than work for established design and marketing ventures most students work in the as freelancers. This, combined with the reality that the East Contra Costa area is not a communications hub compared to Berkeley, Oakland or San Francisco makes recruiting advisory board members increasingly difficult.

That said, with the increase staff in Workforce Development we will work with them to locate new membership. Rebecca Talley, our adjunct faculty has expressed interest in working to revive our committee. With the procedure changes being considered that would allow funding for adjuncts to contribute in this venue we believe we will be able to make use of her expertise.

Our last meeting was in 2015 where we discussed: Addressing various aspects of the graphics industry such as design, advertising, printing, web, packaging and display. Additional topics may include hiring qualifications, industry practices, software knowledge and student intern / shadowing programs.

Our Advisory Board meetings, while interesting, have contributed minimally to directing the program or course content. In general, the employers we do have at meetings say they are most interested in hiring people who are responsible and know how to solve problems. While certainly important, these comments don't provide much specific direction.

Journalism

In 2013, LMC collaborated with Diablo Valley and Contra Costa colleges to develop a districtwide advisory board, which met several times in 2013, 2014 and 2015. In 2014 the district journalism advisory board worked through the Journalism Association of Community Colleges to create a regional journalism advisory board that has met consistently since the fall of 2014 at the annual Northern Regional Conference of JACC. Scheduling meetings that work both for the academic schedule and the schedules of professionals who need to react to daily news is tricky, and we have often faced situations where professionals had to cancel at the last minute. Because most community journalism programs offer similar curriculum to meet both articulation standards and professional needs, we have found a regional approach is a more efficient and effective strategy. By pairing a regional CTE advisory board meeting with a journalism conference, we can also make use of professionals and four-year faculty who are already at the conference site to speak and/or offer workshops and have had fewer attendance problems. Advisory board meeting discussion has recently centered on the changing media landscape and how college journalism education can prepare students both to transfer and to work in a dynamic industry. That discussion always includes both curriculum and technology needs. The pros let us know what new skills our students should be developing and the equipment required to train them. Four-year faculty members inform community college faculty about new transfer requirements in the pipeline and share how well community college students have been succeeding when they transfer to their institutions. Former students working the field can give a unique perspective about how well their education at both levels prepared them for the world of work. Current students offer insights about how current curriculum is working for them. In the previous two academic years we met Nov. 7, 2015 and Oct. 15, 2016. Board members have included community college faculty, journalism faculty from four-year transfer institutions, journalism professionals, community college students and community college alumni. Law Enforcement Academy

The purpose of the Law Enforcement Academy Advisory committee is to provide direct feedback to academy leaders and staff of the workforce expectations, inform Academy content, and provide ideas to strengthen the pipeline for recruitment. The structure of the Advisory Committee is designed to represent student, faculty, industry and public interests as it relates to basic law enforcement training.

Meeting formats/agendas take into account labor market information and data, curriculum review, overall programmatic outcomes (degrees, completers, and employability), resource needs and plans for the future. It is a reflective exercise whereby past Academy students are encouraged to share their thoughts, ideas and experiences.

The last advisory committee meeting was November 17, 2016. This was a joint advisory committee between the ADJUS core degree program and the Law Enforcement Academy. Members included the following:

In February 2017, it was decided that the local Police Chiefs' Association would serve as the Advisory Committee for the Law Enforcement Academy. This group meets once per month and regularly informs Academy Staff, who are adjunct instructors, of needs/expectations of the Academy; however, this group has traditionally not included college administration, students and other members that could effectively give a more holistic view of the program. Going forward, it was decided that one Chief's meeting per year, at minimum would be an integrated Chief's and Law Academy Advisory Committee meeting. The Chief's represent the hiring institutions, and the Law Enforcement Academy is a direct to work program (many are employed by their respective agencies while attending the Academy), so moving to this format seemed like a more effective group to advise the program. The next advisory meeting is scheduled for February 21, 2018.

Licensed Vocational Nursing

Purpose: To receive input from our clinical and community healthcare partners, local industry, educational partners, and our students and staff. We also inform the Board of current data, updates to the program and changes legislation as well as changes in the job market, curriculum, equipment, funding and facilities.

Structure: Faculty and staff, Department Dean, Department Chairs, Associate Dean, LVN Class president and VP, 1st year RN and 2nd year RN presidents and VPs, Clinical Partners and Agency Representatives, Workforce Development representative, Admission and Records Nursing Evaluator.

Effectiveness: The Advisory Board meetings allow us to inform faculty and students about changes in the job market, including opportunities for internships. Our clinical partners are also able to inform us of their policy changes and updates to their requirements for new nursing staff. Our CSUEB partners bring us up-to-date on opportunities for transfer to BSN programs. We also receive important qualitative data from all members. All of this information helps inform all parties of necessary changes to current policies, requirements, protocols, curriculum, etc. to best adapt to the changes in the healthcare industry to better educate our students.
